
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Victoria decided to ask for help because she knew it was best for her family.

## 'Y'all are my people'

**Victoria** is a strong mother of six who has been tested far more than most of us can ever imagine. She suffered multiple abuses at an early age, and thus began her journey of survival and faith.

Forced to leave her childhood home, Victoria endured years with no support or structure. She had children young and then found herself in a domestic abusive relationship. She and her children fled and found protection at a homeless shelter.

Victoria admits it was hard to ask for help, but it was necessary for her children. Looking back on those days, Victoria says that time in her life brought her closer to her children. The small family felt safe and protected by the caring workers in the shelter, and they became involved in a downtown church.

DESC also became part of that support network for Victoria's family by providing clothing for her growing children and encouragement to her during the difficult days. She says she felt the Lord wrapped His hands around her and her kids with love and protection and she was so thankful.

Years later while working as a terminal operator for the railroad, Victoria suffered a devastating injury that left her with a permanent disability and a new set of financial difficulties.

Through it all, Victoria's faith never wavered. She says she spent hours worshipping and acknowledging God's greatness through all of it, knowing her family would be OK.

"God gives me joy! You can't buy it and people can't give it," Victoria said. "You have to break generational curses, no matter how you grow up. We created our family of love. They are healthy, and they love Jesus."

Like so many of our senior clients, Don relies on Social Security as his only income source. His retirement savings in his 401k have been depleted. Don does his best to stay positive but admits that the current economy has presented challenges and struggles that can bring him down.

Today, Victoria and two grown sons (one a teacher and the other an FSCJ student) along with four more (ages 12-19) all live, work and play together. They're usually on the basketball court as a carryover from their days in the shelter.

Victoria says that DESC's clothing has been incredibly helpful including receiving interview clothes, school clothes, work boots and slip resistant shoes (for a son's job in fast food).

DESC also helps with much-needed groceries for family meals. "Y'all are my people," Victoria said. "You inspire us to live right and make good decisions."

Don is grateful for help.

Coming to DESC and three other food pantries helps Don stretch his income so he can meet his financial commitments. Every now and then, he rides the bus to the Publix in his old neighborhood because he feels safer there, knows the workers and likes that they recycle.

Don moved to Jacksonville in 1997 from Long Island after losing his mother. He worked all his life in the auto industry, starting as the parts counter man, then moving on to service manager.

He also drove Yellow Cabs at night and worked part-time on the golf course, caddying, driving carts and working in the pro shop.

Don is grateful to DESC for the food assistance and is complimentary of the way he is treated. He really likes all the produce and canned goods he receives. He is also incredibly grateful for his two "wonderful, wonderful children" who mean the world to him.

# Ready to give up

Nearly 9,000 cases of domestic violence are reported to the Jacksonville Sherriff's Office each year inflicting physical, emotional and financial distress.

The situation is even more overwhelming when separating from a violent home life with children. Such was the case with **Falicia**, a victim of domestic violence looking to create a better life for her son and herself. But where to begin?

After getting a referral for emergency financial assistance through United Way 2-1-1, Falicia was connected to DESC's Emergency Financial Assistance Specialist, **Thalinda Williams**. It was clear early on that Falicia was out of resources, unemployed and in dire need of help.

What started as a standard request for rental assistance, ballooned into much more. During intake, Thalinda learned that Falicia's utilities were also about to be disconnected.

Falicia told Thalinda that she was going to keep her 13-year-old son out of school because she couldn't afford school supplies or food. In a tough spot, Falicia felt holding him back from classes would be best at least until she

got back to work. While not ideal, she felt she had no other choice.

Through DESC, Falicia received financial assistance for overdue rent, as well as help to catch up on her utilities. Falicia was also connected to other resources that provided school supplies so her son wouldn't miss any school. She also received groceries and information about working towards better financial literacy and home buying. And she started her new job.

Falicia continues to express gratitude to DESC for the opportunity to get back on track and is pitching in to help others on difficult journeys by donating to the DESC Clothing Center.

Falicia said she was ready to give up hope and live in her car when she got connected to DESC. She's grateful that she was partnered with such a caring organization and could start to turn her life around.
