Getting more than they asked for

As the new year was just starting, **Sheena** and **Mario** came to DESC looking for food and clothing for their family of nine. They found both and a whole lot more.

The volunteer helping them suggested the married couple consider the DESC Empowerment Program (DEP) for additional resources for their five boys and two girls (ranging in age from 18 months to college).

It turns out both Sheena and Mario had lost their jobs due to COVID. While searching for work and trying to make ends meet, things got even more difficult. One of their cars caught fire and was destroyed, and the other car required a new starter. Without transportation, getting a new job was just about hopeless.

Jan Carpenter, the couple's case manager, gave them recommendations for career advice, family counseling, financial literacy training and additional services – all of which will help Sheena and Mario create obtainable goals for their family.

And, thanks to generous donors, DESC helped the couple find a mechanic and covered the costs to fix the car. Sheena and Mario got right back to looking for jobs, and within a month or so, both were gainfully employed.

Additionally, DESC has partnered with Jax Co Furniture and Mattress Store who supplied the family with three new beds and mattresses. Presbyterian Social Ministries also provided new pillows and linens. "The boys love their new mattresses and actually just having a bed!" said Sheena. "And our mattress and bed are so comfortable."

A proud single mom, Cetoria works part time at Fanatics, but it's a seasonal position and the work ebbs and flows. She recently added a job at Dollar General too! With her CNA classes behind her, Cetoria is eagerly waiting to take the State Boards.

Sheena recently started an online Grow with Google certificate class to build on her interest in the IT field. **Family Promise Jacksonville** provided her with a free Android tablet for classes.

It turns out, education is a core value for the family. Sheena and Mario ensure their children keep up

with their schoolwork before enjoying extracurricular activities. Football has been a big part of the fun outside of school. In fact, the oldest son plays football at St. Thomas University in Miami.

"Sheena and Mario are a young-at-heart, loving couple," said Jan. "They're both very determined to help their family discover the best opportunities available."

"I am so thankful for everything DESC has done for my family," Sheena said. "I am excited about moving forward!"

Race shoes find new life

For the twentieth year in a row, **Carey Hepler** finished the Gate River Run and kept on running eventually stopping at DESC with hundreds of shoes and bags of clothes!

Well, he really drove a U-Haul truck, but it did indeed have hundreds and hundreds of shoes and bags and bags of clothes. Carey, his wife **Ruth Ann** and his brother **Brian** started collecting the used running shoes and T-shirts as they realized that many runners won't wear the same pair of shoes in more than one race.

The shoe drive took off as many racers have embraced the idea of sharing what they no longer need and knowing that those who are unhoused would love to have better shoes.

"Most runners go through a pair of shoes every 3-6 months. The cushioning gets compacted and worn, but they're still great for walking around," said Carey. "Most runners have boxes and closets full of shoes they're not sure what to do with. We love being the middleman to connect runners with DESC."

The Heplers have set up a Facebook page to help promote the effort but being a mainstay at the race for years has yielded the best results. With a tent set up outside of the River Run Expo, race participants drop off their

items and get a high five, handshake or fist bump.

Once at DESC, teen volunteers help unload the shoes and then go about sorting them by size and gender. They sterilize them with disinfectant spray, tie the pair together and get them ready for distribution.

The men's shoes will run out in just a few months, but the women's shoes will last most of the year. In total, the Heplers have collected and donated more than 12,000 shoes and 10,000 T-shirts.

"We couldn't give shoes to everyone who comes in if it weren't for the race shoes Carey collects," said **Beth Wilson**, Program Director at DESC. "They're an amazing resource, and we thank the Heplers for being so helpful for all these years!"

One of DESC's priorities remains helping people in any way possible to help them enter or remain in the work force. Kenneth has gotten by over the last six months by landing temporary jobs through various labor pools. Prior to that, he worked in property maintenance and has driven a taxicab.

On their recent visit, Kenneth was very excited about his new position at one of the local fisheries. He was starting the next day!

The job is in the fresh fish freezer and is 40 hours a week. The pay is

Kenneth is one of a dozen or so recently hired in this type of work who have come for similar clothing. They have all been extremely appreciative of the clothing and accessories as they start their new ventures.

When Kenneth was asked where he saw himself one year from now, he answered without hesitation, "I'll be managing the Fishery!" Go Kenneth! We're rooting for you!
