Abdella has dedicated almost her entire life to caring for children – as a mother, grandmother and day care worker. She loves children and being with them 24/7.

Abdella moved to Jacksonville from Grand Rapids, MI and lives with her grown daughter and her three grandchildren, ages 5, 6 and 12. She stopped into DESC recently for groceries, clothing and other help for her family.

Since COVID, the multi-generational family has spent a great deal of quality time together, homeschooling and practicing reading, math, sciences, art and history. Abdella not only acts as a grandparent but frequently parent as well.

The family enjoys daily walks in the neighborhood, basketball, picnicking and playing in the nearby football fields, as well as occasional trips to the zoo or a museum.

Unfortunately, Abdella has been experiencing severe arthritis in her hip and is likely facing surgery but is trying to "keep on moving and go-go-going." She says she loves living with her daughter and her grandchildren. Every once in a while, they enjoy a treat of a movie or pizza night – "something special to look forward to."

In her quiet time, Abdella likes reading, a little TV, ice cream and cleaning. She says the kids can create a lot of chaos, and she enjoys restoring order to the house.

Abdella says DESC has been such a blessing to her family, helping with her electric bill, groceries, toiletries and clothing. She says the canned goods, especially the meats and soups, allow for easy-to-make meals. She is thankful for peanut butter, jelly, sandwich meats and breads as well, and the frozen meats she receives are always good for 2-3 meals.

"God bless you and thank you very much!" Abdella said wanting DESC donors and volunteers to know how much they are appreciated.

From despair to a new awareness of those in need

Leona was in despair when she called United Way's 2-1-1 just one day after a house fire consumed most of her belongings. She was hoping to get a referral for clothing, but that call turned into a whole bunch more.

It was clear from the onset; Leona was in utter shock, and she was encouraged to join our DESC Empowerment Program (DEP). As a program participant, Leona could receive services to help her put the pieces of her life back together.

The first objective was rapid rehousing. However, Leona had other needs that our DEP staff helped her navigate through more effectively. "I didn't know what to do or the first step to take," Leona said.

To help through the transition, DESC covered hotel fees and worked side-by-side to encourage a heartbroken Leona in her search for available housing. She explored temporary housing solutions, but she found waiting lists at most places.

It took round-the-clock work, but thankfully, Leona was approved for the rental quickly. "I am humbled," Leona said, expressing that she has gained a new awareness of the needs of those struggling with keeping a roof over their head. "This experience has given me a desire to help those in need."

Working with personal connections, the DESC team secured several donations and budget-friendly purchases to help Leona set up her new home. Leona received furniture, a washer and dryer set, dishware, small kitchen appliances, bedding and kitchenware. She also received groceries, clothing and toiletries from the other DESC programs.

"DESC has gone above and beyond to help me get back on my feet," Leona said. "I thank you for all you've done!"

Partnership helps avoid eviction

As a working mother of two, who also has a disabled relative living with her, **Brittany's** worst fears were about to come true – she would be evicted from her home in a matter of days.

Working with the Jacksonville Area Legal Aid (JALA), a determined Brittany had a fighting chance to avoid being put out on the street, but she still needed funds to cover all her overdue rent. That's where DESC and our donors stepped in.

Thanks to a new partnership between DESC and JALA, we can now help clients facing court-ordered evictions, and Brittany was our first case.

The DESC Emergency Financial Assistance team worked diligently

with JALA and Brittany's property management to complete the case quickly as time was of the essence.

With all parties working in tandem, the case was completed, and payment was issued the same day Brittany's response was due in court.

Brittany was hopeful she could stay in her apartment and had saved a substantial amount to contribute towards her outstanding balance, so that meant DESC could help and not exceed our typical maximum for rental assistance.

Meeting the deadline was a victory for all involved.

"I cannot express enough how

amazing DESC and JALA were in helping me and guiding me through one of the most stressful situations," Brittany said. "I could not have done this alone! I am forever grateful!"

Theresa Tippins, DESC Program Director said the new partnership was a great success. "The JALA team, Brittany and the property owner were great to work with. There's a lot of potential in this partnership moving forward."

Brittany is now determined to get on a path toward long-term economic stability, so she won't face this situation again.

"Theresa even talked to me about their program and assistance they offer with financial planning and buying a home," said Brittany who has signed up for services in the DESC Empowerment Program.

"You all have been a beacon of hope, and I look forward to what the future holds," Brittany said. "The work you all do is amazing, and I am positive that it is life saving for many!"

Brittany plans to learn more about her finances and future opportunities while working with DESC. "Buying a home seems impossible, but I now have hope," she said. "My goals of educating my kids and building generational wealth is possible."

Family Matters

With names so similar, it might not be surprising that mother and daughter duo, Latonyal and Latoyal, are extremely close.

The pair recently came to DESC together and shared more about

their lives and what DESC has meant to them.

Latonyal returned to work after seven years of retirement to earn some additional revenue. Unfortunately, she suffered a severe burn on her leg requiring extensive medical attention and physical therapy which ultimately created more challenges. Even through the hard times, she enjoys spending time with her daughter and grandchildren.

Latoyal, who works from home, says she is "very fortunate" to have her mother's help with the kids, especially during the summer months.

Both mother and daughter wanted donors to know how appreciative they are of DESC. Both have received

groceries and clothing. Latoyal also received emergency financial assistance when she was behind on her utilities. She said she greatly appreciates anything that helps with the kids and gives her more time with them.

Both mother and daughter want to start their own, separate businesses one day – Latonyal has her sights on a mobile boutique while Latoyal wants a hair business.

Latonyal said the DESC Clothing Center "is the only place I ever get new clothes from." She loves the mix of gently used items along with new socks and underwear. She said sometimes the donations come with the tags still on.

Partnerships key to DESC's success

Partnerships among downtown churches created DESC 40 years ago this year. Today, those partnerships and many new ones continue to be a driving force today.

When DESC was chartered in 1983, there was a cooperative spirit to help those struggling with poverty. Most of those initial churches are still DESC partners: First Presbyterian Church, St. Johns Episcopal Cathedral, First United Methodist Church and South Jacksonville Presbyterian Church.

That sense of teamwork is alive and well today. DESC works with many similar charitable organizations throughout the year to provide services to the community including the United Way of Northeast Florida, Presbyterian Social Ministries, Sewing Hope for DESC,

Feeding Northeast Florida, Waste Not Want Not, LJD Jewish Family & Community Services, Catholic Charities, Clara White Mission, Sulzbacher, Operation New Hope, Chrysalis Health and many others.

We also have new member churches: Riverside Presbyterian Church and Riverside Avenue Christian Church. And there are many other churches that partner with DESC: Crossroad Church UMC, Impact Church and Mandarin United Methodist.

DESC's collaborators extend beyond churches. For example, DESC started a new partnership recently with the **Jacksonville Area Legal Aid (JALA)** in hopes of helping households already engaged with the legal proceedings of eviction.

"DESC had long believed that the process to help these households was too entangled with complications from the legal system," explained **David Clark**, Executive Director. "But a conversation with **Jim Kowalski** at JALA revealed an eagerness to work together."

That conversation led to assistance for a household already in the courts facing certain eviction. With case workers in both agencies focused on finding solutions, the process was smooth and a resounding success (read more on page 4).

"Partnerships are quintessential for DESC," said **Pamela Prier**, Board Chair. "We are so grateful for shared resources to help families who are experiencing emergencies or poverty."
